Spring Conference 2006

This was a joint meeting of the Society and the Welsh Division of the Royal College of Psychiatrists. It was held in Swansea on the 28th April.

On the preceding evening the Society's AGM was held at the Dragon Hotel. The new constitution was accepted and the main outcome of the meeting was that Professor Bill Fraser was elected as President. Mike Shooter and Professor Mike Owen were elected as Vice Presidents. This was followed by a dinner. The chief guest was Mr Gareth Wardell, a former Labour MP for Gower, who gave a lively entertaining address. His talk covered his parliamentary activity, his work with the GMC, his interest in Mental Health issues and this was interspersed with amusing anecdotes about his elderly father who is over ninety but still working as a barber in Tumble – an old mining village.

Eighty people attended the conference. The glorious sunshine outside encouraged the delegates to enjoy the cool of the Dylan Thomas Centre where the morning commenced with a lecture by Mike Shooter and Professor Richard Williams, on "Doctors Behaving Badly?" This centred on the interaction of the General Medical Council with doctors accused of "bad" behaviour and the impact on those falsely accused. The second lecture was by Dr. David Baldwin on "Unlicensed Applications of Licensed Psychotropic drugs". This was followed by a lecture by Dr. Andrew McCulloch on "Public Mental Health – What Does it Mean for Wales?" The final lecture of the morning was "Assessing Mental Capacity" by Professor Matthew Hotopf.

The Biennial meeting of the Welsh Division of the Royal College of Psychiatrists followed lunch.

The afternoon sessions were an expansion of the morning topics in workshop format, led by the morning speakers. The most popular session was "Doctors Behaving Badly?" where Mike and Richard elaborated on the topic of interaction with the GMC. Mike told us that the GMC was keen to learn from us how they could change their procedures, which have been lacking in consideration for doctors who are the subject of their investigations. Much discussion ensued.

The afternoon sessions ended and we returned to the Swansea sunshine, hoping we could save a bit for Llandudno in November.

Llandudno Meeting, November 10/11 2006

In the evening there is a dinner at the Quay and Spa hotel at Deganwy, which is adjacent to Llandudno. The food and the entertainment will have a real Welsh component. On Saturday morning there is a visit to the lovely small town of Conway and its impressive Norman castle. Our Breton colleagues will have to leave at noon to return to Manchester airport.

WPS 50th Anniversary

During the weekend of October 21st 22nd and 23rd 1960 the inaugural meeting of the Welsh Psychiatric Society took place at the Seabank Hotel, Porthcawl. This popular coastal resort is halfway between Cardiff and Swansea.

Therefore by the end of October 2010 the Society will have been in existence for 50 years and it will be timely for this achievement to be celebrated.

DENBIGH

After being vacant and becoming derelict for 20 years Denbigh Hospital is being redeveloped. The building and the site will be transformed into a variety of residential units and a business park. At least this will safeguard a splendid Victorian building but many local people are disappointed that it is not being converted to a museum and community facilities.

CARMARTHEN

The same process is happening at St David's Hospital, Carmarthen, alas the hospital is no more. It is to be sold to Carmarthenshire County Council. There are already plans for office accommodation and a new court for Carmarthen. However there will be a continuing psychiatric presence and the name is being kept on. A small number of acute units will be retained under the name of Hafan Derwen, St David's Park.

Naturally for the closure policy to take place there has been a drastic reduction in the total number of psychiatric beds, particularly in rehabilitation and continuing care. Mirroring this reduction is the huge increase in the prison population. All the jails are overcrowded and more are being planned and built. Sadly this increase in the prison population is related to the aggressive discharge policy of chronic patients. There is no doubt now that the closure policy was excessive and was undertaken without the build up of alternative facilities for patients with severe enduring mental illness. Clearly the baby has been thrown out with the bath water.

Mrs Olga Riordan

Mrs Olga Riordan has just died. She was the wife of Dr Tom Riordan a very well known Welsh Psychiatrist who was the last physician superintendent of Cefn Coed Hospital, Swansea. He was the first treasurer of the WPS. Despite advancing years he is still in good health and was able to attend one of our recent meetings with his daughter Dr Ann West who is a consultant child psychiatrist in Carmarthenshire.
