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Spotlight On:

Professor Keith Lloyd



Professor Lloyd is the current Chair of the Welsh Psychiatric Society, Dean and Head of Swansea University's College of Medicine, Chair of Mental Health Research Network Wales, Chair of the steering group for DUETS (UK Database of Uncertainties about the Effects of Treatments - which is part of NHS Evidence), member of Samaritans Cymru, member of the reference panel for the mental health charity HAFAL, a director in Swansea's Volcano Theatre Company and clinically a consultant psychiatrist in ABMU. I found out more about his background, what has inspired him to become involved in so many roles and how others can inspire future generations.

Firstly, how do you manage to juggle all of your roles? And secondly can you recommend any time-management courses?!

Variably and no.

What has been the biggest challenge in your career so far?

Different times. Different contexts. Different challenges. Clinically it is every patient I see. Right now it's a huge privilege to be the dean of a medical school. I want to give that my best shot. Particularly as it is Swansea medical school's tenth anniversary next year and we now have a fully functional graduate entry medicine course and three research council centres. I am very fortunate to have such good colleagues.

When studying Medicine, at what point did you know that you wanted to pursue a career in psychiatry and what were the factors that led you into psychiatry?

I considered being a physician or an ENT surgeon. But realistically psychiatry was always going to win out. I like the chance it gives you to practice biopsychosocial medicine. Too many psychiatrists forget they are doctors. Modernising medical careers hasn't helped with that. Too many doctors forget the person and their psychosocial context. Psychiatry gives you the chance to integrate. I am very grateful to my training at the Maudsley for giving me that perspective. The Welsh Psychiatric Society's motto is relevant here too: "Meddyg gorrau, meddyg enaid" - "the best doctor is a doctor for the soul".

There is a recruitment crisis in psychiatry, moreso than in other medical specialties. Do you have any opinions on what the main influences are behind this, and how these can be addressed?

My above answers refer. Actually recruitment in psychiatry is no worse than in emergency medicine, obs and gynae, paediatrics and a few other specialities I believe. Above all it requires those of us in the profession at the moment to be positive role models for the next generation. The collective noun for a group of psychiatrists is increasingly in danger of becoming a moan. We need to address that.

Tell us about a book or person that has influenced your life, either personally or professionally.

There are many candidates. My father. My partner. My friends who keep me on my toes. My children in whose abilities as young adults I am increasingly in awe. At work I am fortunate in having had and continuing to have many good role models. I have been a voracious reader and wish I had more time to lose myself in books now. Recently I have been enjoying Tolstoy. His realist descriptions of human behaviour are astonishing.

Tell us something that people don't know about you.

No.

Conference Highlights

Spring 2013 – The Future Psychiatrist

Joint WPS and RCPsych Welsh Division Meeting
The Village Hotel Swansea

The success of the joint WPS and RCPsych Welsh Division meetings continued with a further engrossing conference in Swansea. With the focus of the meeting on the future of psychiatry it was pleasing to have such a breadth of professionals in the audience from medical students up to senior consultants, interspersed with a variety of other healthcare professionals. There were talks from Dr Sarah Watkins, Dr David Shiers and Professor Simon Wessely, and the conference also afforded opportunity for presentation of research and audit by its members.

Dr Sarah Watkins, Head of Mental Health and Vulnerable Groups in the Welsh Assembly, opened the conference with an enlightening talk on the future of psychiatric services in Wales. The perspective from the Welsh Assembly afforded listeners the opportunity to consider the shape and scope of mental health services at the present time and in the near and more distant future, and the challenges that will inevitably arise.

Dr David Shiers, Primary Care Advisor to NAS, Royal College of Psychiatrists

Dr David Shiers, Primary Care Advisor to NAS at the Royal College of Psychiatrists gave a lecture on protecting the cardio-metabolic health of people with severe mental illness. He explored the aetiology of physical illness in those with mental illness, including the effect of antipsychotic medication. Dr Shiers used a variety of sources and research to demonstrate the importance of monitoring, treatment, and primary and secondary prevention of physical illnesses. The underrecognition and under-treatment of physical illnesses in those with mental illness by both psychiatrists and GPs was also highlighted. This has been acknowledged by the Royal College of General Practitioners, notably by the late Professor Helen Lester in her prestigious James Mackenzie Lecture to the Royal College of General Practitioners' AGM on 22nd November 2012. The subject of recruitment in psychiatry was then explored by Professor Sir Simon Wessely, Vice Dean of the Institute of Psychiatry and Chair and Head of the Department of Psychological Medicine at King's College London. Professor Wessely has researched and published on the topic, including a recent article in The Psychiatrist, "UK Crisis in Recruitment into Psychiatric Training" (2013) 37:210-214. The well-known factors influencing recruitment (including stigma) were discussed along with a multitude of other factors, together with suggestions on the first steps in addressing these.

Dr Phil Jones' Synopsis of his research, Suicide: Changing rates of death by cause in Wales 2000-2009

"In recent years there has been an increase in the number of 'narrative verdicts' recorded by coroners in England and Wales. The Office for National Statistics (ONS) codes these deaths on the basis of information on intent noted by the coroner. A high proportion of deaths from poisoning and hanging that receive accidental verdicts are found, when subjected to clinical review, to be suicides. We carried out analyses that also included deaths coded as accidental hanging and strangulation and poisoning.

"Younger people receive proportionally more Accidental verdicts than expected (p < 0.001). Regression analyses shows a decrease in both the rate of suicide ($R^2 = 0.37$) and open verdicts ($R^2 = 0.67$) and a marked increase in the rate of hangings and poisonings classified as accidents ($R^2 = 0.36$). The overall rate of change for Suicides, Opens and Accidental deaths remains almost unchanged ($R^2 = 0.06$).

"The analyses reported here confirms the statistical significance of the observed changes in the pattern of the classification of cause of death across the study period. These may impact on how we interpret temporal changes in the patterns of suicide."

Cardiff CASC Training

Cardiff CASC Training (CCT) formed in March 2012, has been responsible for delivering the MRCPsych CASC training for all Wales. It has got five proactive and enthusiastic members. Dr Omer Minhas (Chair) is an ST6 in CAMHS. Dr Gemma Williams and Dr Yusuf Rangoonwala both are ST6 in General Adult Psychiatry. Dr Muhammad Ather and Dr Marque Fernando having just completed their training are currently working as locum consultants in CAMHS and substance misuse psychiatry respectively.

In its relatively short history, Cardiff CASC Training is pleased about the positive contribution that it has made towards preparing candidates from Wales for the MRCPsych CASC. The excellent feedback we have had from candidates, examiners and all others involved, is a testament to that. While there can be many ways to measure the outcomes, none is more important than the actual exam results. Among the candidates who attended the training event in July 2012, the pass rate exceeded that of national pass rate by a noticeable margin. This was the first time such a result was achieved among candidates in Wales since the advent of Royal College of Psychiatrists CASC exam. In the recently held MRCPsych CASC exam the percentage of success among the candidates from Wales was significantly high.

While we are proud of our achievements to date, we continue to work hard in improving further and providing excellent training. Any comments and suggestions in this regard are much appreciated. Our next event is a Mini-CASC Workshop on 28th November 2013 and a Mock CASC Exam on 5th December 2013.

Public engagement film events:



There are a number of film events related to mental health over the coming months. There is a new season of sciSCREEN events coming up in Cardiff (www.cardiffsciscreen.co.uk).

In parallel to this, films will be shown regularly at the Hadyn Ellis Building, Cardiff, to engage various publics with mental health issues (see Cardiff University website). The WPS might have a presence in one or two of these events. Some screenings will be part of the MRC Centenary celebrations, following on from the successful public engagement evenings and arts exhibition, 'How the light gets in' (www.cardiff.ac.uk/lightgetsin), which took place over the summer. There will also be another 'Medfest' early next year to engage medical students and trainees with psychiatry.

Developing an online package for depression in young people

Over the next 2-3 years, we are developing and evaluating an online psychoeducation package for adolescents with (or at high risk of) depression, and their families/carers at the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Section, Cardiff University. This would fit with health, social and education services to help engage young people with mental health issues. We will hold interviews and discussion groups with a range of young people, parents/carers and professionals, and work with a multimedia company, to determine the content and design of the package. 


As it was so popular, this event could be run annually, and perhaps become a feature of the academic calendar. I'm sure students would be happy about that.


The next Mock CASC exam will be very similar to the MRCPsych exams with 4 x 2 linked stations and 8 single stations with 2 minutes feedback at each.


